Flag Retirement at the Lighthouse - by John Shaw

"Flag Retirement".....is the term used to define the proper, dignified way of destroying United States flags that are no longer fit to serve the nation.

We are a group that loves our flags to fly. Westport's iconic "Big Flag" at the Maritime Museum has been a fixture for thirty years and we now are able to display it proudly at the Lighthouse for special occasions as well.

On Flag Day weekend this year we were lucky enough to give a hand with a very special event. Boy Scout Troop and Pack 148 from University Place stayed in the Military Campground next to the Lighthouse. Very nice group of families, Scouts and adult Leaders and they helped out raising our big flag and toured the Lighthouse.

We learned that one of their activities across the weekend would be a formal "Scout" based Flag Retirement Ceremony. The Maritime Museum had recently been given flags from the Coast Guard Station for retirement so we were able to add one or our old small flags along with those of the Station and a retired flag from the "Invincible" CG-52313, for the Scouts to retire along with theirs.

Saturday evening on the beach below the Lighthouse Trail, the Scouts and families performed the formal flag retirement ceremony. Hats off to the Scouts and the Leaders as it was very well done and, as evidenced in some great pictures from member Kris Cox, very moving as well.

After questions from a lot of people about the ceremony, we figured it would be a good time to remind ourselves of this aspect of flag etiquette.

The United States Flag Code, Title 4, Section 8k states - "The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem of display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning."

How do you know your flag should be retired?

Who Owns the Lighthouse?

And then there is the enjoyment..... June 30th, 2018 will mark the 120th anniversary of the dedication of the light in the Grays Harbor Light Station and we are going to have a **BIG** party! It will be a fun-filled day capped off with the lighting of the Fresnel lens at the top of the lighthouse. Mark your calendars – more details will be coming.

As always, we need volunteers to make all these things happen - each one of us needs to step up and take 'ownership'. So if you have a few spare hours or dollars, please contact Julie at the museum office to find out how you can help.

2017 Proposed By Law Changes

The bylaws committee met and reviewed the current bylaws. In order to be more in line with the theory of "Say what you do and do what you say" the committee and Board are proposing the following bylaw changes to be voted on at the annual meeting in October.

1: Article IV Section 2,

The Vice-President shall be chair of the membership Bylaw sub-committee.

The reason for this change is that in recent history the work of managing the membership has been turned over to employees and we felt it is more appropriate that the vice president is chairperson for the By-Law committee.

2: Article VI Section 1,

Quarterly membership meetings shall should be held. The annual membership meeting shall be held in conjunction with the October quarterly membership meeting shall be designated the annual meeting.

The reason for this change is that we have not had actual quarterly meetings in each quarter of the year. We actually have two meetings in the October, November and December quarter and none in the July, August and September quarter. The wording of this bylaw says that we 'shall' but we don't hold meetings in each quarter.

3: Article VIII Section 1a.

The committee shall draft and recommend to the board of trustees any needed changes. no later than June of each year.

The reason for this change is to give the committee the flexibility to review any time of the year as participants are available and/or issues arise.

"Serendipitous"

Adjective: serendipitous

Occurring or discovered by chance in a happy or beneficial way.

"a serendipitous encounter"

Well that's just what happed to me recently. I always enjoy getting to spend some time working on organizing the collection. Several months back, in going through some saved boxes with some "yet to be organized" piles, I found a group of phone notes with a call from someone saying they had a relative buried on Destruction Island and wanted to know if the Maritime Museum had any information. The note was from many years ago, but anything "D.I." is high on my list, so I called the number and made contact with the "Hillands", who were surprised but very happy to talk. I got the story about a family member who had perished in 1927 after grounding on the West side of Destruction Island during a storm and who was buried on the island. I had never seen reference to this and was a bit skeptical of the story but they said they had a few pictures and an article to go with the story. Ever quick to offer to scan and archive with our new equipment, I invited them to visit or send me what they had. They decided they would visit after a stay they had planned at Seabrook.

This past Sunday, Jack and Jeanette Hilland called at the Museum. In the months between the call and the visit I had hit all our contacts and experts on Destruction Island and no story of a grave marker being seen and a lot of skepticism. Jack and Jeanette are very nice and showed me from their family genealogy files, information on John Maenpaa of Astoria, Oregon. Also a Daily "Astorian" front page from 1927 and just below the fold, a story of an unexpected gale and local fishermen lost on Destruction Island. Then they bring out two wonderful pictures of the boat, the F/V "Pioneer", on the rocks at what looks like the NW corner of D.I. and then a photo of the grave marker. New photos of DI are always exciting for me. The photo's are compelling as is the story of who took them, and how they were sent to John Maenpaa's wife, Jack's grandmother. I am thinking through all of the ways that might have happened and most would have involved the Light House personnel on the Island at the time so I am wondering who to hit up now that I have specific dates.

I as I am re-reading the newspaper account, the story next to it on the Front page catches my eye....."AVALON GOES ASHORE" - then it hits me. This is the same event that wrecked the steam schooner "Avalon" which is one of two ships we suspect might be the 'Wandering Wreck of Washaway Beach' that we have been researching. The other being the *Trinidad*. There is some information in this newspaper account of the Avalon's actual "twice grounding" and final location that we had not yet stumbled upon. As this is sinking in, and I'm thinking how fun this will be to run down further, that word 'serendipitous' sticks in my head and of course I later have to double check on Google....."discovered by chance in a happy or beneficial way"

Yes, **Serendipitous.** And the icing on this cake: after a really nice long chat with the Hillands, Jeanette asked me my father's name and when I tell her she smiles and tells me she knew him. She was a Freshman at US Grant High School in Portland when he was a Senior and had grown of three blocks away from where my Dad did which was also just a short distance from where I grew up. Then the stories really got started. I am looking forward to more on the Destruction Island side of the story as well as running down the lead on the Avalon and having another chat with Jack and Jeanette.

Governor Inslee kicks off 120th Anniversary of Lighthouse



On July 24th, Washington State Governor Jay Inslee came to tour Westport via boat from Aberdeen. The governor attended a luncheon of local officials at the Westport Maritime Museum's McCausland Hall, followed by a roundtable with various representatives of the region's seafood and fishing industries in The Destruction Island Lens Hall. The Lens was a wonderful backdrop for the group's discussions.

Later that evening, Gov. Inslee was welcomed to the Grays Harbor Lighthouse by John Shaw and members of our Board of Trustees. He was given the tour of the Lighthouse by Pete Eberle and Lowell Deaton. Gov. Inslee then lit the original Third Order Fresnel Lens of the State's tallest Lighthouse to kick off the Historical Society's year-long celebration of the beacon's 120th anniversary. To commemorate the event, Gov. Inslee was given a basket of Lighthouse items by Board President Kimmi Kerns.

Sometimes your flag will only need to be cleaned to restore its original appearance. Regular cleaning of your flag can extend its life considerably. Flags can be machine-washed with a mild detergent in cold water. Flags should be hung to dry or laid flat. Do not fold the flag if it is damp.

If it is possible, mend a tattered flag at early signs of wear. The edge furthest from the staff, known as the "fly" end is usually the first part of the flag to show wear. The fly end may start to unravel due to weather conditions.

It is really up to you to decide when your flag is ready to be retired. If the flag is unable to be repaired or is too tattered then the flag should be retired.

Isn't burning the flag an act of desecration and a sign of rebellion?

No, throughout history, burning or cremation has long been considered a dignified way of paying respect to the deceased and to objects worthy of veneration. Burning has been applied to flag retirement to offer the most reverent method of final tribute.

Who is authorized to retire a U.S. Flag?

Anyone. The Flag code does not authorize any particular organization with the duty of retiring unfit flags. Any one person or group can do it. However, flags should be retired in a solemn, dignified event. There is no one official ceremony required or recommended.

An alternate option is to separate the blue star field from the stripes and then to separate the stripes from each other. Once this is done the material is no longer a flag and the pieces may be respectfully interred as part of the ceremony.

Is it permissible to cut up the American flag?

Yes, some organizations even recommend cutting the flags into smaller pieces before placing them in the incinerator or on the fire. When doing this please keep the union of blue intact. Doing so symbolizes that the unity of our union should never be broken.

New Flag Pole at the Maritime Museum

The Maritime Museum's iconic Flag pole was dedicated in 1987 to Fr. William Quick and was funded by several local businesses and the Historical Society. The new pole was authorized by the Westport City Council to be purchased from Lodging tax revenue recognizing its importance as a tourism draw. Druzianich and Bush families along with Quiga Brothers have made donations as well to the installation and new monuments.

The new pole is a mandrel wound fiberglass. composite. This will give better performance in our local marine environment which was so hard on the old steel pole. Of course 30 years service to the Community is not bad.

The flag pole installation was under the direction of Greg Barnes, the head of the Westport Streets department. Using the City Crew and Quigg Brothers crane and operators, the old pole was taken down and the new one installed between 9:30 am and 12:30 pm on July 20th.



There had been a great deal of prep work prior setting up the new base which is a concrete sleeve pier that is a 12 foot deep concrete element. The new base structure include a compass rose.

In final measurements, the old pole was 100' above ground. For years it was thought that the flag pole was 110', which it was. But upon removal it became known that this number included the 10 feet that went below ground into its culvert style base. The new pole finished out at 99' above ground. Some initial worry about being shorter was quickly put aside once the actual measurements were in hand. The new pole is engineered to carry the big 30 x 50 flag. There is a smaller flag that will be flown on a more regular basis to preserve the large flags. The "big" flags will fly for Westport "events". The wear and tear on the big flags gets expensive so this plan will extend their lifespan.

The new Flagpole will be formally dedicated on Saturday, September 23rd at noon as part of the Westport Maritime Festival.

There is still need now for another new large flag in the rotation. It's been two years since the last fund raiser. We expect to have a fundraising opportunity in place for people to support the flag in an ongoing manner shortly.
